FROM THE PRESIDENT

"Inspired by Jewish values, NCJW strives for social justice by improving the quality of life of women, children, and families and by safeguarding individual rights and freedoms."

This is the second half of our mission statement.

Although we mention it often and use it as our rubric for all of our endeavors, how often do we consider what those Jewish values are? Let us look at the Jewish values that inform and serve as a foundation for our work at NCJW/Greater Detroit.

The first is Kavod Ha Bri'ot: Respect and Dignity for all Human Beings. Rabbi Eliezer says, "Let your neighbor's dignity be precious to you as your own. (Avot 2:10). Each and every one of us is made in the image of God--B'tselem Elohim (Genesis 1:26)," which means that each one of us contains a divine spark and that we must endeavor to always treat every person with compassion and dignity. Every human being, regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation or physical or mental disability is deserving of full inclusion and every opportunity. Clearly, our advocacy work in Lansing, on the Hill, and in Israel shows how NCJW works to achieve respect and dignity for women as we work toward ending violence against women, ending human trafficking, ensuring reproductive health and rights, protecting women's access to safe and legal abortions, securing and protecting contraceptive access for women in the United States and Abroad, promoting a fair and independent judiciary, and working to achieve equal pay for women.

The second value is Talmud Torah: Education and Awareness.

The rabbis in the Talmud (Kiddushin 40b) conclude that education is essential because it leads to action. NCJW has a longstanding history of educating our own constituency and speaking up about the issues that help us fulfill our obligation to "love our fellow as ourselves." (Leviticus 19:18) Since education is a critical component in raising awareness in order to create meaningful social change, NCJW has recently formed the Public Affairs Education Committee. Education is also at the forefront of our community service projects such as reading and tutoring at Coleman A. Young Elementary School, Education Assistance, and our Jewish Youth Awards.

The third value is Tzedek Tzedek Tirdof: The pursuit of Justice.

The Torah teaches that we are obligated to pursue justice for all (Deuteronomy 16:20), that we must always take action when we see an injustice (Leviticus 19:16), and that we must "do what is right and what is good" (Deuteronomy 6:18). Through tzedakah (philanthropy) advocacy and community service, NCJW works to realize its vision of a just society—a society in which everyone will have full and equal access to the quality of life to which all are entitled. Our Project Friendship and Luggage for Freedom are two perfect examples of NCJW's bettering the quality of life for Kadima clients and for women and their families transitioning into a new life situation. Inspired by all three of our Jewish values is Exodus, NCJW's Anti-Sex Trafficking Initiative. I am proud to announce that NCJW/Greater Detroit has formed an Anti-Human Trafficking committee whose goals are public awareness, education and advocacy. There are many ways we can work toward these goals, and I look forward to the ideas that the committee will generate and then to the implementation of them. The chairs of this committee are Sharyn Gallatin, Marilyn Nathanson, and Cathy Cantor.

This year we have tried to protect women's reproductive rights in state and federal halls of power, championed civil rights and women's rights in the courts, launched NCJW's anti-sex trafficking initiative, helped children get ready to go back to school with our first annual Back 2 School Store and Backpacks, empowered women and families in Israel in times of crisis and in everyday life, and promoted and protected our right to vote.

If you are not already active in NCJW, I invite you to join us. See how much satisfaction and enjoyment you will derive from working with us as we continue to be inspired by our Jewish values, while making a difference in our community and society.

Jewish Youth Awards

Do you know any outstanding high school seniors?

If you do, please encourage them to participate in the annual National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Detroit Section, Jewish Youth Awards.

NCJW/Greater Detroit is proud to continue the tradition of honoring exceptional high school students who demonstrate strong leadership within the community.

All high school seniors are invited to apply. To be eligible, an applicant needs to fulfill the following requirements:

Submit (6) copies of a typed essay (600-800 words) on the following topic: "What experience or person has had the greatest impact on your Jewish identity?" **MUST BE ANONYMOUS-- THESE COPIES SHOULD NOT HAVE THE APPLICANT'S NAME ON THEM ANYWHERE IN THE ESSAY.**

Submit (1) letter from a religious institution documenting the applicant has had a formal Jewish education (e.g. has become a bar/bat mitzvah, has been consecrated or confirmed, or is presently attending a congregation's high school program).

Submit (6) copies of applicant's leadership positions or other involvement in the Jewish and/or secular community on the form provided. **MUST BE ANONYMOUS—NO NAME ON THIS PLEASE.**

Submit (1) current photograph attached to the application.

Submit (1) application form which can be found on our website, www.ncjwgds.org

Be available to be interviewed by a panel of judges on April 26, 2015.

NOTE: This application form and all the copies of supporting documentation requested above must be received at the NCJW office, 26400 Lahser Rd, Suite 306, Southfield, MI 48033-2675, no later than Friday, February 27, 2015 at noon.

Finalists will be recognized at an Awards Ceremony at the NCJW office on April 28, 2015.

ISRAEL NEWS

NCJW recently announced a new round of grants to eight Israeli organizations whose work is focused on gender equality and women's empowerment in Israel. The grants enable NCJW to make commitments in Israel that mirror our work for social change and religious liberty in the United States.

Empowerment and leadership programs for women and girls, as well as gender equality, are the cornerstones of NCJW's Israel Granting Program. Recipients have programs designed to address women's rights and well being in areas such as economics, politics, education, domestic violence, and social justice. NCJW's Israel grants are made possible by generous contributions from individuals and NCJW sections across the country.

This past summer, NCJW also made emergency grants to assist populations served by former and ongoing grantee organizations that were made vulnerable by the Israel-Gaza conflict.

The 2015 grantees include:

Isha L'Isha – Haifa Feminist Center: Fighting Against Trafficking in Women and Prostitution project. Isha L'Isha has been leading the fight against trafficking in women and prostitution and assisting trafficking victims long before such trafficking registered on the national agenda. Its project advocates for national policy changes in the treatment of women seeking to leave prostitution and seeks to educate service providers and the public about the abuses of the sex trafficking industry.

Research Institute for Innovation in Education (RIFIE): Training Bedouin Women for the Workforce as Educators in the Pre-School Sector. This unique NCJW Research Institute for Innovation in Education project empowers Bedouin mothers who wish to work outside the home by training them for paraprofessional work and placement in the early childhood education sector in their communities.

Israel Hofshit: Freedom in Marriage Now. The Freedom in Marriage Now campaign seeks to mobilize public pressure on key politicians through a two-tiered approach of media

communications and community organizing with the goal of establishing civil marriage as an option in Israel for everyone, regardless of religion or sexual orientation.

Tmura – The Israeli Antidiscrimination Legal Center: Protecting Women's Reproductive Choice. Tmura's new campaign will work to protect reproductive freedom through litigation, advocacy, and public education on behalf of the rights of Israel's most vulnerable women.

Jerusalem Open House for Pride and Tolerance (JOH). NCJW's grant will support the organization's work meeting the specific needs of those in the transgender community, who are too often excluded from programs and services available to gays, lesbians, and bisexuals. The grant will provide transgender activists in Jerusalem the security and flexibility to organize independently and unite with a stronger voice, as well as increase the access of transgender individuals in Jerusalem to services currently beyond their reach.

Yerushalmit Movement. Dedicated to building Jerusalem as a vibrant, pluralistic, and inclusive city, the Yerushalmit Movement has helped reduce gender segregation based on religion, including the exclusion of women from public spaces in Jerusalem. NCJW's grant will enable the Movement to create women-led forums in neighborhoods across the city to promote equality and improve quality of life. For the first time, Ultra Orthodox Jewish women and Arab women will be engaged in the conversation to encourage civic collaboration among women activists of diverse religious sectors.

Turning the Tables. Active in Tel Aviv since 2011, Turning the Tables addresses the vocational and economic advancement of women leaving the cycle of prostitution and sex trafficking. NCJW's grant will establish a pilot program to extend services to new locations throughout Israel.

Women of the Wall. NCJW's grant will support advocacy for women's equality to gain the right to read Torah at the Western Wall. Despite the groundbreaking legal advances made by Women of the Wall in the past two years to ensure women's right to pray freely at the Western Wall, roadblocks to full freedom remain.

BACK 2 SCHOOL STORE... 2015

Plans are busily underway for the 2015 Back 2 School Store, which will open for business on Sunday, August 9th, 2015. Again this year, we will provide each child with a complete set of new clothing, including underwear, socks, pants, shirt, coat, gloves, hat and a new pair of shoes. Additionally, each child will receive a new backpack filled with school supplies and personal care items. Each child will "shop" with a personal shopper for the clothes he or she wants and will be able to leave the Store with a complete outfit.

There are many ways to help: fundraising, hospitality, public relations, set up, day of volunteering, tear down, and designing and securing resources for the Resource Room for the parents and guardians of the children shoppers. The beauty of this project is that there are lots of ways to get involved. If you are interested in being a part of this fabulous experience, please contact the office. LITERACY OUTREACH EXPANDS ITS TUTORING PROGRAM AT COLEMAN A. YOUNG ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Now in its fourth year, the NCJW/Greater Detroit Tutoring Program at Coleman A. Young Elementary School (CAY) is reaching out to more students than ever before. In addition to our already established "one-on-one" tutoring program, we have created a "group tutoring" program. We have gone from tutoring approximately 12 students, individually for 30 minutes of instruction/week, to 12 students each receiving 45 minutes of instruction/week. We are also tutoring an additional 21 students, three times/week, in small groups. So, in sum, we have almost tripled the number of students we are tutoring, and we are tutoring for longer periods of time with some of the students being seen three days/week!

We have a double-sized partitioned classroom dedicated by the school for our tutoring purposes. In our "one-on-one" side, tutors choose from a variety of available teaching materials (worksheets, books, flashcards, games, white boards...) and often bring other materials to enhance their creative teaching style. (It should be noted that many of our tutors do not have prior teaching experience!) Over in the "group tutoring" side, tutors work with up to four students at a table. They divide their time between using worksheets and decodable books. Tutors use their creativity in this setting, as well; however, the group tutoring uses a more scripted program.

We are always happy to welcome new tutors to our group. So if you have a couple of hours available on Monday or Tuesday mornings, and would enjoy working with 1st or 2nd graders, contact the NCJW office and a chairperson will get back to you.

In other news... Our work at CAY doesn't end with tutoring! We have a dedicated group of volunteers who work in the library on Thursdays, from 9:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. They have taken an empty room and have created a cozy "Reading Room." As the school is using the Accelerated Reader book system, volunteers are labeling and color coding the books, and then shelving them for student use. Volunteers are also re-shelving books that have been taken out by students. There are some students who are helping our volunteers, and all are having a wonderful time together! If this is something that interests you, feel free to join us!

Here's another opportunity to have fun at CAY. One day each month, on a Thursday morning, we read to classes. Volunteers meet at the NCJW parking lot and carpool together to the school. We read in one or two classes, for up to 40 minutes, and then return to NCJW. For more information, contact the office and Judy Robinson will get back to you.

Our partnership with and commitment to the students at CAY seems to grow each year. We have become part of the "CAY Family" and as such, are greeted with smiles and hugs. Join us and experience the joy of making a difference in a child's life!

STATE POLICY ADVOCATES

The 113th Congress recently adjourned, but before adjournment the House narrowly passed the Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act (HR 83), a \$1.1 trillion spending measure to keep the government funded through 2015.

Although there were several controversial amendments passed as part of HR 83, there was one that was a small step forward for reproductive justice. The final version included language from the Peace Corps Equity Act, originally a bill championed by Senator Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) and Representative Nita Lowey (D-NY). As included in the budget agreement, the policy would fix an unjust ban that, since 1979, has denied Peace Corps volunteers the same health coverage of abortion as other civilians insured through a federal program. This fix would ensure that Peace Corps volunteers have abortion coverage in cases of rape, incest, or when a women’s life is at risk.

While NCJW continues work to end all bans on abortion coverage and remove restrictions that deny women care outside of those narrow circumstances, NCJW supports this long overdue measure extending equity to Peace Corps volunteers.

Conservative members of Congress pressed for harmful policy provisions, also known as “riders,” to be included in HR 83. One rider of particular concern to NCJW would restore grant funding to states to implement abstinence-only-until-marriage programs, which have been proven ineffective at supporting the sexual and reproductive health needs of young people. The rider would make unspent funds from the fiscal year 2015 federal abstinence-only-until-marriage grant program — approximately \$12-\$15 million per year — available to states that require this ineffective, harmful program. Under current policy, funding is returned to the US Treasury. The federal guidelines for state abstinence-only-until-marriage programs include elements that allow for one religious view to be imposed on students, and shame sexually active youth and lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students, among other troubling requirements. NCJW will

continue to speak out against this ineffective, harmful program and work to support comprehensive approaches to sexuality education that are evidence-based, medically accurate, inclusive, and age-appropriate.

As the 114th Congress begins, NCJW will continue to work on issues including: immigration, reproductive justice, human trafficking and judicial nominations.

Adult Guardianship

Adult Guardianship is a program that grew out of Children's Advocacy. The thinking was that if we could be useful in helping children through Probate Court, maybe we could help adults who have court appointed guardians. It turned out to be a good idea and over the years, NCJW has developed an important role serving as a link from the Court to the Guardian, to the Ward, and back to the Court. It is a role we take seriously and consider necessary in assuring competent care for those having court appointed guardians.

Once a month, NCJW receives 5-10 cases from Oakland County Probate Court. Our Adult Guardianship volunteers speak to the guardian, make a site visit to the individual, fill out a form, and send it back to Court. Most of the people we visit are in nursing homes or assisted living facilities, and all of the facilities are in Oakland County. The visits take just a few minutes, but they can be very rewarding. The visits can be done with a partner or alone, although we would only go to a group home with a partner. If you would like to learn more about volunteering for this program, call the office.
