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FROM THE PRESIDENT



Susan Marwil

My past two years as President of Greater Detroit Section have been filled with fun, challenges, and successes. It is my honor and privilege to work with so many of you: NCJW's compassionate, committed, and caring women. As I look back on all of the activities that have taken place, I realize how much we have accomplished together.

We began our first Back 2 School Store in August, 2014 with our Honorary Chair, Suzanne Simon. It was a huge undertaking, but our section organized and brought about a success. Our second Back 2 School Store in August, 2015 was modeled upon the original and succeeded in bringing smiles to over

380 children who enjoyed "shopping" for their new outfits for school. Soon after the first Back 2 School Store, our Fall Focus featured Theresa Flores, who spoke about her experiences as a victim of sex trafficking. That event and National's initiative on sex trafficking motivated me to encourage our SPAs (State Policy Advocates) to create a Human Trafficking Awareness Committee, now planning a Human Trafficking Symposium for October 30. In addition to our advocacy that includes Action Alerts, we formed a Public Affairs committee. Kym Worthy, Wayne County Prosecutor addressed our Fall Focus audience in October, 2015.

Some of our members were concerned that we do not do enough for our Jewish Community youth and elderly. Upon a visit to Jewish Family Service to investigate, I discovered the Orthodox day schools could use assistance. Thus, our tutoring, reading at Darchei Torah became part of our already well-established, highly regarded and successful program at Coleman A. Young Elementary School. Our Backpack volunteers packed almost 1000 backpacks for Jewish children in need and homeless children in Oakland County. And our Wrapped in Love volunteers made 800 fleece blankets for children taken from their homes by Protective Services and for children receiving chemotherapy treatment in several hospitals. In addition, we partnered with Jewish Senior Life for a Nosh and Knowledge in February, 2016 where 36 Meer residents and NCJW members combined welcomed Rabbi Joseph Krakoff as the speaker. Our section also contributed 12 welcome kits to the Center for Elder Abuse Prevention at Jewish Senior Life. Our Meals on Wheels program delivered 26,000 Kosher Meals this year thanks to our dedicated and caring day chairs, packers, and drivers.

Education is an important aspect for NCJW; thus, our trip to Quicken Loans to see how Detroit has grown, our Public Affairs evening events on the Court System and Immigration, and our two new Book Clubs. Our Teen Yellow Pages, another educational source, became 4 pages thicker with some new information; we have orders for well over 5000 copies. The Baby Yellow Pages, one of the newest educational projects, began its research early in 2015 to establish a booklet, website, and perhaps an app. These pages will enlighten Detroit parents with the phone numbers and agencies for numerous problems a parent to be and a new parent would encounter. We have also partnered with Jewish Community Center's Jewish Book Fair and the Lenore Marwil Jewish Film Festival that have brought another aspect of education to our Section and the community.

In January, 2015, the Board of Directors set up two goals: increasing membership with at least 125 new members in a year's time and making NCJW more visible in the community. Our membership co-chairs and their committee have been working to attract, increase, and maintain members, and they are succeeding. Our visibility has come from our monthly Jewish News sidebars and the personal notes each new member receives from the co-chairs. But our 125th Anniversary celebration is capturing much of the present community attention with plans for a High Tea on May 11th and a memory book open for you to record your NCJW memories.

Relatively new branches of NCJW/Greater Detroit may well take on another spotlight: GROW, Girls Reaching Outward, has taken on a new look with its capable advisor, Rachel Matz. It is planning an Art Expo that will be showcasing its winners at the Human Trafficking Symposium. Carol Klein and Randie Levin are spearheading a come back of a Business and Professional Women's Branch of NCJW/Greater Detroit.

The Court Watchers' Pilot Project, new to NCJW, will take its volunteers into District Courts and Circuit Oakland County to observe trends in the courtroom to help preserve the dignity of domestic abuse victims. NCJW Children's Advocates continue to be the "eyes and ears of the courts"



by giving their recommendations to the judges concerning guardianship in order to protect the rights of children.

Our fundraising goals were realized through planning and hard work: our Women Of Vision events featuring Kate Edwards and our Fashion Show, that gave focus to National's Israel Granting Program for Turning Tables, a vocational training and economic empowerment program for women in Israel exiting the cycle of prostitution and sex trafficking, our revived Hannah's Heroine campaign adding 9 new Hannah's Heroines (Penny Blumenstein, Dale Frankel, Carol Freedman, Marlene Goodman, Susie Jacob, Randie Levin, Barbara Mayer, Marilyn Sabin, and Bluma Schechter) from June, 2014 to date whose funds for NCJW's future will add to the already 26 women who had become Hannah's Heroines at its inception in 2008. Our newly formed Name Fund Committee has added one new Name Fund, the Ruth L. Frank Project Friendship Fund. The success of the Stav at Home Tea and Annual Support will ensure the continuance of our programs, projects, and advocacy efforts here, in Washington and in Israel.

How fortunate I am to work with so many incredible women! My Vice-Presidents--Susie Jacob, Sandy Lada, Jennifer LoPatin, Sandi Matz, and Judy Robinson have guided their committees with skill. Our State Public Advocates, Cathy Cantor, Irma Glaser, and Sharon Lipton have worked hard to keep our Section abreast of on-going legislation that affects the lives of women, children, and families. Our committee chairs and committee members have kept all of our many projects and programs active and productive. The Board officers, Marian Littman, Jacqui Elkus, Deede Auster, and Maxine Sherman have made sure our Board and I are on task and informed. In addition, the remarkable NCJW/Greater Detroit office staff continues to amaze me with their loyalty and capability. I am grateful to Susan Gertner, Executive Director for her guidance and dedication.

My best wishes to Sandi Matz, our incoming President. Her expertise and enthusiasm will strengthen our Section and help us continue making a positive impact on our community.

On a personal note, serving as President of NCJW/Greater Detroit has been one of my most satisfying and rewarding experiences of my life. This position has reinforced my commitment to helping those who cannot help themselves. I appreciate your trust and dedication, and I am proud of all we have accomplished. Together we have worked to build a promising future.

The Time for Equal Pay is Overdue! Join Us to Rally in Lansing!

Friday, January 29th, marked the 7th anniversary of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. NCJW was there for that momentous occasion - the signing of President Obama's first major piece of legislation. Our National NCJW President and Washington Office Director were asked to attend the ceremony because of the hard work that NCJW has done for many, many years to try to eliminate the gap in pay between men and women who do the same jobs. The Ledbetter Act extended the time period in which claimants can bring pay discrimination claims, enabling victims of pay discrimination to seek redress when they otherwise could not.

Lilly Ledbetter's story was not unlike that of many women. In 1979, Lilly Ledbetter worked as a supervisor at Goodyear Tire and, although her salary started at the same level as her male

counterparts, over the next 18 years her salary did not increase as did the salaries of male supervisors. By the end of 1997, Ledbetter was earning \$3,727 per month while the lowest paid male manager received \$4,286 and the highest received \$5,236. Ledbetter was the only woman working as an area manager.

Once she discovered the pay discrepancy (purportedly through an anonymous note from a co-worker), Ledbetter sued Goodyear in a lawsuit that eventually made it to the Supreme Court, where she lost because she had not filed suit 180 days from her first pay check – even though the court acknowledged she couldn't have done so because she didn't know it at the time!

Because of the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, women who discover pay discrepancies now have more time to file their claims of discrimination.

Unfortunately, despite the Ledbetter Act and other actions taken by the current administration, the wage gap still exists – and has only improved marginally over the past several years. In 2014, a woman's pay was 79% of that of a man doing the same job. In Michigan that number is 77%. And the statistics for women of color are worse. Since women make up nearly half of the labor force, this inequity severely impacts the lives of women, children, and families.

On the anniversary of the Lilly Ledbetter Act, President Obama took another step toward solving this problem. He announced a plan requiring companies with over 100 employees to annually report salary data by race, gender, and ethnicity. Having real and accurate pay data collection would provide the ammunition needed to finally move this fight forward. Too often, pay discrimination goes undetected because of a lack of accurate information about what people are paid. This new requirement expands on an executive order of President Obama's from April of 2014 that called for federal contractors to submit salary information for women and men. The new plan affects all companies with more than 100 employees.

Here in Michigan, we have been fighting the pay equity fight for many years. The Michigan Equal Pay Coalition, of which NCJW is a member, has been rallying once a year at the Capitol on Equal Pay Day. Equal Pay Day is always in April and symbolizes how far into the year a woman must work, on average, to earn as much as a man earned in the previous year.

This year, the Michigan Rally to Support Equal Pay is Tuesday, April 12th. Women – and men – from all over the state will gather in Lansing to show our legislators that the time for equal pay for equal work is long overdue. Wearing red (to symbolize women workers are "in the red"), we will stand united in our fight!

NCJW has arranged for a bus to Lansing on that day. We will meet in the Adat Shalom Synagogue parking lot at 8:15 am to go to Lansing. The day will consist of training, visits with legislators, the rally on the State Capitol Steps, and speakers in the Rotunda. When we meet with our legislators, we will be urging them to pass a package of House and Senate bills on pay equity. The cost for the bus, training and lunch is \$15.

JOIN US! Stand with our colleagues from around the state to let our legislators know that this is an issue we care about – for ourselves, our daughters, our granddaughters, and for every working woman in Michigan! Spotlight on...

Children's Advocates

We spoke with Liz Bank (one of our Chairs) and Beverly Stone (an advocate for 17 years). Here is what they had to say:

When did our Children's Advocates program begin?

The program began in 1980 when NCJW/Greater Detroit began working with the Oakland County Probate Court.

Can you please explain a bit about the program and what you do?

The purpose of this program is to be involved in minor guardianships, advocate for children, and make sure they are in a healthy guardianship situation. The court assigns cases to the chairs of Children's Advocates, and they distribute them to the volunteers. There are always two advocates for every case. There are two kinds of cases: one, the team goes out to the homes to make sure the case is working well, and then they complete a report for the court. The other type of case requires a home visit with a team of two. They evaluate the situation, write a report to the court, and bring the case to a judge in a hearing. They then follow up with the case.

CHILDREN'S ADVOCATES

Holidays, celebrations, weather; never stops the Children's Advocates from working on cases. These cases are about minors in guardianship some of which require investigations, reports, court appearances and recommendations to the judge in the minors best interest. The Children's Advocates can also assist minors and guardians should they need support and service resources. We are looking forward to our May in-service. It is being planned to provide relevant information and resources to our members so we are able to better serve our clients, the minors and their guardians, in the greater Oakland County area.

How does one get involved?

We recruit volunteers by word of mouth and we are listed on the NCJW/Greater Detroit website for those seeking this kind of work. You do not have to be a member of NCJW/Greater Detroit to join the program. One calls the NCJW office and a form is sent to them, and returned with a resume containing background and experience. Going forward, there will be interviews in order to be an advocate. Many of our Children's Advocates have been teachers, school counselors, social workers, and therapists. There is a training every year.

What has been your most rewarding experience being involved in this program?

Beverly: Being a resource to the guardian with regard to information that would help make the guardianship more successful.

Any additional information you'd like to provide about the program?

It is an extremely rewarding opportunity to help children and families. If you would like to get involved, please contact the office for more information.

Project Friendship

Court Watchers

At the March 1, 2016 Board meeting, the implementation of a new pilot program called Court Watchers was approved.

Court Watcher programs have been functioning since the 1970's and many have been sponsored by NCJW sections throughout the country. The Court Watcher program is designed to provide a community presence in the courtroom during cases of domestic abuse. The volunteer Court Watcher observes the proceedings and records her observations on a form. A report is then generated which is turned into the court. The goal is to assure that victims are being treated respectfully and that any necessary improvements will be made.

Volunteers will receive comprehensive training in the cycle of domestic abuse and courtroom procedures. They will be asked to volunteer for several hours at least once a month.



WHAT'S NEW WITH NCJW IN ISRAEL?

The Israel Granting Program (IGP) committee recently met and has chosen six organizations whose work is focused on women's empowerment, gender equality and religious pluralism.

NCJW's Israel Granting Program supports grassroots projects throughout Israel that work to improve the lives of women, children, and families through women's empowerment and progressive social change. Since the founding of Israel, NCJW has supported non-profit,



NCJW members and supporters across the United States help raise funds for the Israel Granting Program. More than one third of NCJW's 70 community based sections have made IGP one of their key program initiatives. Greater Detroit is one of the sections that support this important work.

2016 Granting Partners

ISHA L'ISHA – Haifa Feminist Center: Fighting Against Trafficking in Women and Prostitution project. This project works to end the sexual and physical abuse of women trapped in the sex industry. Their work advocates for change on the national level, educating the public about the abuses of the sex industry, direct assistance to women who are victims of extreme sexual, physical and emotional abuse, helping them leave prostitution behind and providing them with the tools needed to reclaim their lives. Their direct service work in 2016 will focus on mail-order brides who are trafficked into the country.

THE NCJW RESEARCH INSTITUTE FOR INNOVATION IN EDUCATION AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY (RIFIE):

Training Bedouin Women for the Workforce as Educators in the Pre-School Sector. This unique NCJW Research Institute for Innovation in Education project empowers Bedouin mothers who wish to work outside the home by training them for paraprofessional work and placement in the early childhood education sector in their communities.

ISRAEL HOFSHIT: The Center for Training and Initiatives has emerged as the leader in organizing the public and training social change activists in Israel for freedom of and from religion. In order to integrate more Israeli women activists and leaders on gender issues into the larger movement, the center will seek to integrate alumni and faculty from the NCJW Women and Gender Studies Program at Tel Aviv University. The community engagement work will fuel a grassroots movement of skilled and organized activists to secure Israel's democratic principles and finally win full equal rights for men and women in personal status issues and anywhere in the public sphere where they are attacked or undermined by religious extremism.

JERUSALEM OPEN HOUSE FOR PRIDE AND TOLERANCE (JOH). NCJW's grant will support the organization's work meeting the specific needs of those in the transgender community, who are too often excluded from programs and services available to gays, lesbians, and bisexuals. The grant will provide transgender activists in Jerusalem the security and flexibility to organize independently and unite with a stronger voice, as well as increase the access of transgender individuals in Jerusalem to services currently beyond their reach.

YERUSHALMIT MOVEMENT. Dedicated to building Jerusalem as a vibrant, pluralistic, and inclusive city, the Yerushalmit Movement has helped reduce gender segregation based on religion, including the exclusion of women from public spaces in Jerusalem. NCJW's grant will enable the Movement to create women-led forums in neighborhoods across the city to promote equality and improve quality of life. For the first time, Ultra Orthodox Jewish women and Arab women will be engaged in the conversation to encourage civic collaboration among women activists of diverse religious sectors.

HILLEL – THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE. For over 20 years, their mission has been to help those who chose to leave the Haredi ultra-Orthodox community and successfully integrate into Israeli society. The complex challenges faced by those who leave these communities are magnified for single mothers, some of whom have suffered abuse, and all of whom face financial distress and struggle to navigate the secular world. The grant provides job training, tuition scholarships for education, funds for legal fees to battle their former husbands and families in the religious courts for custody over their children. The program targets 48 single mothers aged 18-30.
