Time is truly flying, as I have now been President of NCJW/Greater Detroit for close to a year. I have learned so much from you as members, board members, officers, and past presidents. We are working as a team to further the mission

of NCJW. I think it is worth repeating that we are a grassroots organization of volunteers and advocates who turn progressive ideals into action. Our goal is to improve the quality of life for women, children, and families, as well as safeguarding individual rights and freedoms. This past January, we did just that. We made our voices heard, we spoke up and spoke out, as we participated in the Women's March on Lansing. As you may have heard me say, it was a difficult decision to choose to participate on Shabbat. However, we followed the lead of our National Organization and decided it was an exception to be made. Irma Glaser was our "leader" along with assistance from Sue Simon, Florence Herrmann, and Susan Gertner. Irma had a vision to hire a bus and travel to Lansing as a group. The first bus filled within 36 hours and Susan Gertner found a second bus, which filled just as quickly. We had green signs that we held high and proudly as we listened to inspirational speeches throughout the day. We needed to be there!

In December we sent out a Chanukah card for our Annual Support Campaign. Thank you very much for your continued support. If you have not yet participated, you will still have a chance as another mailing will be going out shortly.

In February you should have received your Stay At Home Tea Invitation, I hope you enjoyed your tea, relaxed and didn't have to go anywhere! This year our Stay At Home Tea will benefit Children's Literacy and other Youth Projects.

At times when I look at all that NCJW/Greater Detroit does in the community, I am overwhelmed. We have made a positive impact in so many areas and have helped so many individuals. However, every three years we take a look at our community service projects and review them and decisions are made as to whether we continue or discontinue a project. The reasons we might discontinue a project are many. For example, it might not be cost efficient anymore, the population it serves may not require it, or some other agency or organization is duplicating this effort. This year under the guidance and direction of the chair of the community service review, Sharyn Gallatin, along with her committee, has recommended to the board of directors the elimination of three projects. After approval from the board the decision was made to no longer provide Jewish News on Tape for the visually impaired, Luggage for Freedom, and Money Matters Secured Credit Card Program.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

There is no longer a need in the community and it became cost prohibitive to provide JNews on Tape to the visually impaired, Luggage for Freedom did not involve enough volunteers, and Money Matters did not attract enough recipients. By eliminating these projects, this will allow us to better focus on our current community service projects.

On Sunday, February 26, our section partnered with the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit and other organizations for a lovely program at the DIA. Chocolate, Coffee, and Judaism was the topic, with speakers Rabbi Deborah Prinz and Professor Howard Lupovitch sharing their expertise on the subject. We then sampled a chocolate buffet and explored the DIA special exhibit; Chocolate, Coffee & Judaism. Janice Soble (our DIA expert) was instrumental in bringing this program to NCJW as well as suggesting to Federation to include the Rabbi as a speaker.

The "Spring Play" committee has been very busy ironing out all the details for our June 8 performance of "How Did I Get Here?" written and directed by local playwright, Judi Schram. The chair of the event is Helene Cherrin, and we know we are in good hands as she chaired our last play Love, Loss, and What I Wore. Please check page 11 for more details of audition dates, rehearsal dates, and other ways to become involved in the play.

The membership committee, chaired by Jan Goldfarb and Sallyjo Levine, held a wonderful "prospective" and "new" member event planned, called Talk and Tiles. This took place on Tuesday, March 21, where board members shared their knowledge of NCJW as well as created an NCJW mosaic to hang on the wall in the boardroom.

Our programming committee has events coming up in the next few months that you won't want to miss. Judy Robinson and Sandy Weiss are planning a Detroit Public Library Tour and then lunch in a local downtown restaurant. Sue Simon and Gail Katz are planning an evening event at GreenSpace Cafe, a local restaurant, where we will learn about healthy eating as well as listen to Rabbis Marla Hornstein and Jennifer Kaluzny from Temple Israel talk about the biblical and modern incentives to eat well.

May marks the month of Installation, and we will install and welcome new Vice President, Sue Rollinger, as well as several new board members. Your invitation for installation is in this bulletin for Wednesday, May 17 at Knollwood Country Club. Please join us.

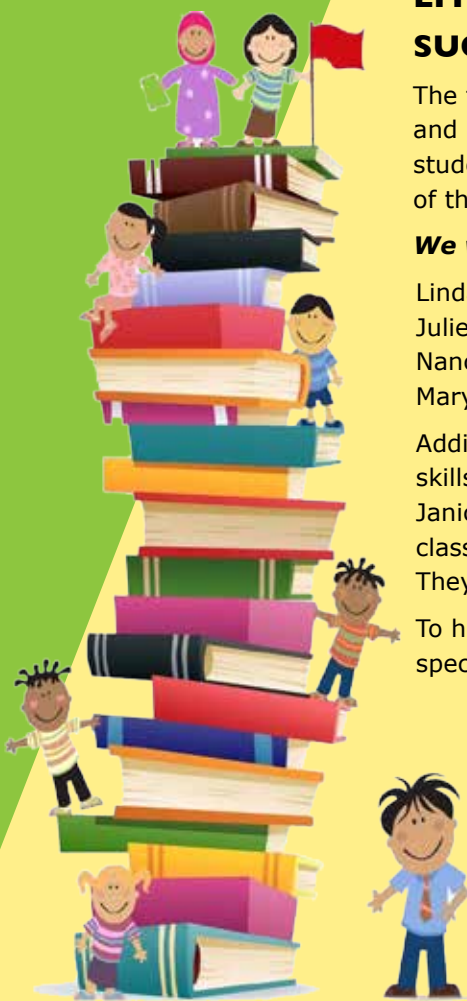


## NCJW/Greater Detroit BACKPACK PROJECT

## STATE POLICY ADVOCATES

On January 21st, NCJW/Greater Detroit packed two buses with 115 advocates and joined thousands of Michiganders in Lansing to speak out against hate and intolerance, and speak up for the issues that are so important to us. Across the country, millions of other advocates were doing the same thing: speaking up and speaking out.

Since then, it has seemed our speaking out has not been heard in Washington, as though the chasm between our position on issues that affect women, children, and families and the position of the current administration is simply too wide.

Then on February 23rd, President Trump stated, during a meeting with various organizations committed to fighting human trafficking, that he would commit the full force and weight of the U.S. government against what he views as an epidemic of human trafficking around the world.

Fighting against human trafficking is a commitment our Section made years ago and the basis of "Exodus," our national organization's campaign to end sex trafficking. Perhaps this is one issue on which we can work with the 115th Congress and the 45th President.

The Greater Detroit Section held an important Human Trafficking Awareness Symposium in October and recently hosted a program featuring a sex trafficking survivor and her therapist. Educating the community about human trafficking, both sex and labor, is a priority of our Section, and future programs are being planned. Awareness that trafficking exists (and exists everywhere) and knowing the warning signs are critical in order to bring this crime out of the shadows and into the light and finally have a chance to end it.

It is estimated that more than 27 million people around the world are trapped in forced labor, including agricultural labor, commercial sex, domestic

work, and debt bondage. Trafficking occurs across the United States, and involves American citizens, foreign nationals, and stateless people. Survivors often find themselves locked up in the criminal justice system or held responsible for crimes committed while trafficked, instead of receiving needed support.

The Jewish Coalition Against Trafficking is an umbrella coalition of national Jewish organizations with campaigns to end human trafficking (including NCJW), that have come together to strengthen our collective voices and achieve concrete policy change. The Coalition has issued a statement of values to guide its efforts: "Ending Human Trafficking: A Jewish Statement of Values."

Please email your legislators and let them know that you support the following values, and urge them to join us in making them a reality:

1. Every human being is deserving of respect and dignity.
2. Every human being has the right to make their own decision about their body, life, and future.
3. The fight to end human trafficking must be rooted in both justice (tzedek) and compassion (chesed).
4. Survivors of trafficking are the experts of their own experience.
5. Survivors of trafficking are not criminals.
6. We must address the root causes of trafficking in the United States.
7. We must dismantle our culture of sexual violence and objectification.
8. We must commit to changing the dynamics of an economic system where the constant demand for cheap goods and cheap labor directly contributes to modern-day slavery.

## 313 BABY

Our committee has been working to create a resource guide, modeled after the "Teen Yellow Pages," but targeted toward young women in Detroit who are either pregnant or have just given birth. The resource book, entitled "313 Baby," features a list of agencies that provide various types of pre-natal care, as well as agencies that are accessible with information on a variety of topics for new mothers. The resources provide information on a wide variety of topics, ranging from tips for care of newborns, obtaining diapers, to mental health care.

The committee is also working toward creating both a website and app to complement the guide. The target date for completion is June 1, 2017.
