When you are reading this bulletin we will be halfway through the fall season, summer is in the distant past while winter is in the not so distant future. We look forward to the changing seasons and the new programs and continuing projects that keep us busy during the winter months.

In July, many of us had a wonderful time at the NCJW Games Day Luncheon. It was again held at Beth AHM and was chaired by Rosalie Dean and Enid Schatz. This is an annual fundraiser which this year will benefit our youth projects and was hugely successful. Shortly

thereafter hundreds of volunteers, parents, grandparents, and grandchildren showed up to our office to sort and pack 1200 backpacks for homeless children in Oakland County (K-12) as well as 300 for Jewish children in need identified by Jewish Family Service. Deede Auster, Jan Goldfarb, and Amy Zeskind were the fabulous chairs who organized this worthwhile project under the guidance of Vice President, Susan Rollinger. Right on the heels of this school oriented project was the year-long planned Back 2 School Store, chaired this year by Lauren Koenigsberg, Sallyjo Levine, and Jennifer LoPatin. This dynamic trio under the advisory of past chair Sharyn Gallatin and Vice President, Susie Jacob, ensured that this year NCJW | MI would serve almost 600 children from the City of Detroit. These children were pre-selected by 15 social service agencies. As in each of the previous 4 years, each child received clothing and school supplies to start off the school year with the right tools for a most successful year. Close to 400 volunteers participated in this exciting and community driven project. Jewish Community Relations Council/AJC provided a multi-faith health fair for the parents while they waited for their children, Lakeshore Legal Aid provided free legal services, and United Way was on hand to offer advice as well.

What's next? We have many programs and projects ahead of us, so please get out your calendars and mark them down. Our annual benefit luncheon, Women of Vision chaired by Lauren Koenigsberg, Sue Lasser, and Susie Serwer with VP Judy Robinson will be held Thursday, October 11 at Adat Shalom. The keynote speaker is former President of Planned

Parenthood, Cecile Richards and this year we will be honoring 2 outstanding community members for their dedication and commitment to the issues that NCJW supports. Cathy Cantor will receive the Josephine S. Weiner Community Service Award and Monni Must will receive the Woman of Vision Award. Please join us to hear our speaker as well as to honor our award recipients and get a head start on your Chanukah shopping at the boutiques. Please see the details for this event throughout the bulletin. Shoes to Share sorting and collection dates are on our website. Shoes to Share is chaired by Gail Katz and Jeannie Weiner under the supervision of VP, Susie Jacob. Gently worn shoes are collected from schools and houses of worship and distributed throughout the community to those in need. Next is Fall Focus. Vice Presidents Amy Cutler, Sharon Leider, and Susan Rollinger are planning an evening about women's issues in Israel as well as NCJW's involvement in Israel, for Thursday, November 1st. Watch for more details. In the winter our popular Nosh & Knowledge luncheon series will return with fascinating speakers. Don't forget that Project Friendship brunches and outings take place twice per month for clients of Kadima with Barbara Berger, Susan Sabbath, and Carol Wiseman at the helm under VP Susie Jacob. Volunteers are always welcome. Our SPA's Cathy Cantor and Irma Glaser have planned a free program to educate everyone on Proposal 2 (the Gerrymandering issue) that will be on the November ballot. Please join them on October 4, 2018 at the Farmington Community Library at 6:45pm (see page 7).

As you might remember last fall we changed our name to National Council of Jewish Women, Michigan. Our goal was to reach out to women in communities who are interested in advocacy but did not have a way to participate or be educated on issues of importance. Since changing our name we have started traveling to outstate communities, and engaging women and helping them to have their voices heard alongside of ours. Cecile Richards is a national leader for women's rights and social and economic justice, and the author of New York Times bestseller *Make Trouble*. As President of Planned Parenthood Federation of America and Planned Parenthood Action Fund for 12 years, she worked to increase affordable access to reproductive health care and to build a healthier and safer world for women and young people.

After starting her career as a labor organizer, working with women earning the minimum wage, she went on to start her own grassroots organizations, and later served as Deputy Chief of Staff to House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi. In 2011 and 2012, she was named as one of Time Magazine's 100 Most Influential People in the World.

Ms. Richards is a frequent speaker and commentator on politics and progressive issues. She and her husband, Kirk Adams, have three children and live in New York City and Maine.

As a dedicated advocate for social justice and a believer in the power of grassroots activism, Cathy Cantor has found her ideal volunteer position as State Policy Advocate for National Council of Jewish Women. Cathy has served for the past six years as Co-SPA for Michigan, a National NCJW appointment. In this capacity, Cathy is an integral part of many coalitions that work to improve the lives of women, children, and families – the mission of NCJW – by advocating for equal pay, gun violence prevention, elimination of human trafficking, protecting women’s health, supporting a fair and independent judiciary, and defending voters’ rights.

A Life Member of NCJW, Cathy served as President of the Michigan Section from 2008 – 2010 and has served as co-chair of many committees including Governance, Human Trafficking Awareness, and Women of Vision. Nationally, she served as an NCJW Commissioner and a Field Action Network coordinator. She has been on the board of the Jewish Community Relations Council/AJC for six years, serving as Vice President for three.

In addition to working at the portrait studio, Monni creates images that “give back” to her community. She is involved with Jewish Hospice, Kadima, the Holocaust Memorial Center, and Beaumont Hospital, where she provides photos to parents grieving the loss of a newborn. Monni has created an extensive portrait collection called Living Witnesses: Faces of the Holocaust, depicting 400 Holocaust survivors and capturing their stories to guarantee that their stories would never be forgotten. Monni is married to Joel, and they have three daughters and two grandchildren.

STATE POLICY ADVOCATES

As State Policy Advocates, we strive to keep our NCJW | MI members aware of problems that impact issues that are so important to the well-being of women, children, and families in our state and nationally. Our bulletin articles, action alerts, and visits to our legislators are the means we use to influence positive outcomes for women's health/choice, court appointments, equal pay for equal work, gun safety, voting rights, and so much more. However, of late, our efforts have not resulted in many gains.


It has become apparent that because the controlling political party of the state legislature has the ability to draw the map for our voting districts, gerrymandering or packing the districts to maintain control of the makeup of the legislature, has silenced the voices of the majority of Michigan voters. The bright spot in our future that will lead to fairness in drawing the district lines is Proposal 2 that will appear on the November 6 ballot. The proposal offers an independent Citizens Redistricting Commission composed of 13 people: 5 independents, 4 Republican affiliated, and 4 Democrat affiliated, to decide the voting map.

Thousands of volunteers circulated petitions to secure 428,000 signatures for this proposal. Both the Michigan Court of Appeals and the Michigan Supreme Court have said the language is acceptable for the ballot. Now, more volunteers are knocking on doors and speaking with voters to get out the vote to support Proposal 2.

NCJW|MI will present a free program to educate our community about Proposal 2 (See page 15 for details). Katie Fahey, Executive Director of Voters Not Politicians, who spearheaded the campaign for an independent commission, will be our keynote speaker. Former Republican State Representative and State Senator, Dr. John J. H. (Joe) Schwarz will bring his experience and wisdom to explain why an independent commission is necessary. Also presenting on this topic will be Oakland County Treasurer, Andy Meisner.

Most importantly, we encourage you to attend this program as well as bring friends, family, colleagues, associates, and anyone else you can think of to help get the word out and learn about Proposal 2. With your support, we will regain our voices as we work to improve the lives of women, children, and families. Further details will be sent via action alerts, email, and on our new NCJW |MI website.



EDUCATION ASSISTANCE

At the William Davidson Jewish College Loan Cycle 1 program meeting on July 10th, they awarded a total of \$1,262,250 in interest-free loans and \$37,000 in grants to 174 college students for the 2018-2019 school year.

NCJW | MI Education Assistance provided funding to 23 students receiving \$65,000 in interest-free loans and \$5,000 in grants. There were 4 new students, 12 returning students, 2 medical students received funds from Maimonides, plus 5 grants.

NCJW|MI BACKPACK PROJECT

The Backpack Project was a phenomenal success again this year! With over 150 volunteers, we were able to organize an assembly line of the supplies for elementary, middle, and high school children on Wednesday, July 25. On Thursday, July 26, enthusiastic volunteers filled the backpacks in record time. Oakland Schools received 1,200 backpacks and distributed them to homeless children throughout the county. Jewish Family Service received 300 backpacks and distributed them to children in need in the Jewish Community.







KOSHER MEALS ON WHEELS

For 45 years, NCJW | MI volunteers have been making sure that homebound members of the Jewish community have kosher meals delivered. This NCJW | MI program is co-sponsored with Jewish Family Service (agency social workers provide intake) and Jewish Senior Life (meals are prepared and picked up at the Prentis Apartments).

I recently had the opportunity to see Kasher Meals on Wheels (KMOW) in action. Under the leadership of KMOW Coordinator, Paul Neuberger, the program operates 5 days a week. Volunteer packers arrive early to place the correct meals in the right bag for each recipient. Both lunch and dinner are available.

After all the meals are packed, the drivers arrive at the kitchen, including the shuttle driver, who delivers to the drivers for Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield, Novi, etc. Other drivers have regular routes closer to Prentis Apartments. Drivers develop relationships with the participants and, in addition to delivering meals, can notice if something is wrong and alert JFS staff, or, if necessary, call 911.

Kasher Meals on Wheels is a very important service and truly a Mitzvah. We can all take pride in the incredible work of the staff and volunteers.

What an amazing day! What an amazing year of preparation! The National Council of Jewish Women, Michigan's Back 2 School Store was held on Sunday, August 12th. During the course of the day we served almost 600 Detroit children and their parents or guardians, pre-selected by 15 social service agencies.

Over 300 volunteers worked magic as children received new clothing, including a winter coat, gloves, a hat, two shirts, pants, a pair of shoes, socks, and underwear. They also went home with a backpack filled with school supplies, personal care items, and a book.

The Back 2 School Store is an annual one-day event to help Detroit students in need have the right tools for a successful school year. The pop-up store is designed to look like a department store, where each child "shops" with a personal shopper for new clothing: shirt, pants, socks, underwear, winter coat, hat, gloves, and shoes. The child also selects a new backpack and fills it with school supplies, a new book, and personal care items.





...from a Back 2 School Volunteer

Today I met a child who made me smile ear to ear. She made me skip across a gym floor and enthusiastically run from one area to another. She made me excited to look at Winter clothing, even on the sunniest Summer day. Today I met a child who made me smile ear to ear while I struggled to hold back tears.

For the last five years, the National Council of Jewish Women, Michigan (NCJW | MI) has organized and run the Back 2 School Store--a one day event during which Detroit's children come and "shop" for new clothing, shoes, and school supplies for the upcoming school year. The children are identified by various social service agencies and are pre-registered for the event, allowing volunteers to shop with specific numbers and sizes in mind, ensuring that children get brand new items and plenty to choose from. Grants, individual donations, and a year of fundraising raises money to sponsor each child, so that everyone coming through the store does so for free. A volunteer personal shopper escorts each child through the store so that the children can pick out their own items and have a day that is all about them. While their children shop, parents and guardians have access to a resource room and health screenings, receiving important information that can help their families.

I have participated in this event every year since its inception and have loved every minute of it. As amazing as the experience is every year, today I met a child who changed this day for me, and reminded me why this project is so important.

When I first took her hand and led her into the store, her head swiveled in every direction, looking at all of the brand new coats, backpacks, shirts, hats, gloves, shoes, pants, and school supplies, all for her choosing. We started with a winter coat, and as I watched her bring the soft, puffy coat up to her face to feel the fleece it hit me: this child, this ray of sunshine, has probably never had something brand new to call her own. She selected a bright pink coat and we found a hat and gloves that matched. With each new table we visited she would bring something up to her face to feel the newness, the softness, the "her"ness of it all. She hugged every volunteer she met. She waved to all of the children she recognized from her agency, going to hug many of them as well. She was a spark of energy in an already exciting day, and I felt so lucky to be the one leading her through this experience.

When it came time to try on shirts and pants, my heart began to break. When we first started shopping, her bright smile and enthusiasm distracted me and I didn't take in the stains on her pants and shirt, the shoes with the soles falling out, and the socks that had been well-worn for quite some time. As I slipped a package of brand new socks into her shopping bag, I couldn't help but think about how often I have taken for granted the ease with which I buy new socks. Had I ever even thought about that before? Had I really considered how a new pair of socks could make this child feel?

As we tried on shoes her excitement grew. Brand new red sneakers that didn't match a single thing she picked out but that she loved anyway. A new backpack and school supplies followed, with her choice of an age appropriate book to take home as well, but my mind was stuck on those socks. Tucking the new, soft, clean socks into her bag while watching her struggle to put on the socks and shoes she came with, I was reminded why we were there. Almost 600 children came through the store today and left with things they needed, or wanted, or a bit of both. They left confident and ready for the school year. They left with the love of almost 400 volunteers rooting for their success. And, in turn, they left their mark on our hearts and minds, reminding us with a simple smile why we love this project so much and how important it is. Today this little force of nature made me smile from ear to ear until I could go into the other room and cry for all of the little forces of nature that weren't there today and that we couldn't buy socks for. But there's always next year.


