We had an extremely successful Women of Vision benefit luncheon on October 11, 2018, chaired by Lauren Koenigsberg, Sue Lasser, and Susie Serwer, where we honored Josephine S. Weiner Community Service Award recipient Cathy Cantor and Woman of Vision awardee Monni Must, and were energized by our keynote speaker, Cecile Richards,

former president of National Planned Parenthood of America.

Angela spoke of her conversion from a fundamentalist sect to Judaism as outlined in her memoir, A Tree Could Be a River. Carolyn, the regional director of the Anti-Defamation League, gave us an update on anti-Semitism, both locally and nationally. Her message was, "If you see something, report it to ADL."

On December 11th, several of us traveled to Flint to meet with potential NCJW | MI members and presented a version of "You Be The Judge," by Courts Matter chairs Susan Marwil and Sue Simon. We have also met with women in Lansing and Ann Arbor and will hold a Michigan Institute in Lansing in May. Stay tuned for further details.

Courts Matter Michigan Coalition

In 2017, NCJW | MI established Courts Matter Michigan Coalition, a non-partisan coalition of diverse organizations* united in their efforts to ensure a well-functioning federal judiciary composed of qualified judges who are committed to upholding



our core constitutional values, including equality, freedom, and justice for all.

The coalition educates the public and our elected officials about the importance of judges who sit on federal courts for life. It informs its coalition members about the judicial nominations process and records of judicial nominees who will be charged with protecting our fundamental constitutional rights. It mobilizes Michiganders to speak out and take action to ensure a fair and independent federal judiciary through a process that identifies and provides timely confirmation votes for all well-qualified and diverse nominees dedicated to fairness and impartiality.


There have been many recent appointments to our federal courts that have seemed to have been too quick and without enough consideration of citizens' input. Some people feel that citizens' interests have been suppressed. The reality is that the public does not have a chance to act upon these occurrences. However, our coalition was formed not only to educate but also to inform the public about the importance of speaking to their senators, asking them to support justices who will uphold our constitutional values. Courts Matter Michigan Coalition strives to make the public and our senators aware of those nominee judges who are not qualified because of their lack of experience, educational background, lack of fairness, or independence in their thinking. That is the only chance the public has to make a difference in this process.

Our short-term goals are to make the public aware of the violations of the judicial process that have transpired and to encourage our senators to speak out on the Senate floor against judges who are not qualified, are not fair, and not independent. Our long-term goal is to continue to educate the public about the importance and the process of lifetime federal judicial nominees. This is perhaps our most significant goal for today because Federal Judgeship appointments will continue beyond the present time. We need to begin now to prepare for the future.

Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has.

This quotation by Margaret Mead has a educational programs about gerrymander.

This quotation by Margaret Mead has never rung as true as it did on election night when it was announced that Proposal 2 – the constitutional amendment that creates an independent citizens' commission to handle redistricting in our state – had passed.

The fact that a grassroots volunteer group – relatively small, definitely thoughtful, and certainly committed – could effect a change in our Michigan Constitution that will benefit our state's citizens for years to come . . . well, that could be viewed as remarkable! But Margaret Mead was right, we shouldn't be surprised. This IS how things get changed. We cannot wait for our legislators to fix what is wrong. They've proven that they are not presently capable of working together and finding solutions. Unlike the volunteers for

Proposal 2 (which included many NCJW | MI members) who came together for a common cause and, working side by side, did the hard work necessary to pass the anti-gerrymandering proposal!

In addition to our support of Proposal 2, NCJW | MI also supported Proposal 3, which removes obstacles to voting. The news on election night was especially uplifting when it was announced that Proposal 3 had also passed.

• Hats off to Voters Not Politicians, who organized the Prop 2 effort, and to NCJW | MI who hosted and conducted trainings, recruited volunteers, and held

educational programs about gerrymandering and redistricting, as well as Proposal 2 itself.

- Hats off to Promote the Vote, of which NCJW | MI was a part, for their work in getting the word out about Proposal 3.
- Hats off to all the volunteers, including many, many NCJW | MI members, who collected signatures on petitions, canvassed neighborhoods, knocked on doors, and manned phone banks for both Proposal 2 and Proposal 3.
- Hats off to Michigan voters who showed up in numbers not seen since the 1970 midterms.
- Hats off to the women who ran and won in this year's midterms. Michigan's women legislators increase from 25% to 35% with this election. We're getting there!

We can't help but be buoyed by the passing of Proposals 2 and 3. And when we consider the wise words of Margaret Mead, we realize that other issues so important to us – commonsense gun legislation, equal pay, protecting women's health (including reproductive health), supporting a fair and independent judiciary – all these and more CAN be attained through the grassroots efforts of a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens.

We still have work to do. And now we can be more optimistic that we will be successful!



Human Trafficking, Sanctum House, and NCJW | MI

NCJW | MI has been educating the community about human trafficking for more than a decade. When we held our first educational program, the general consensus in the community was that human trafficking existed – but not in our state, county, or city. Most people thought it was a problem in other countries, not the United States. Our first program dispelled that notion – but only for the 45 people in attendance!

Since that first program over 10 years ago, we've continued to offer educational programs on human trafficking to more and more members of the community and today there is much greater awareness about the topic and a realization that it exists in almost every county in every state in the country.

Along the way, NCJW | MI connected with Edee Franklin

who had a vision of creating an adult women's shelter for victims of human trafficking. When Edee began her quest, there were fewer than 20 beds in Michigan for adult women victims of trafficking to have long-term treatment. There were beds for girls and teens, but not for adult women. It took many years, but Edee's vision became a reality last year. Sanctum House, a shelter for adult women victims of trafficking, is now a reality. And, with a maximum number of 16 beds, Sanctum House will almost double the number of beds available for adult women.

NCJW | MI has been involved with Sanctum House from the beginning, providing liaisons to serve on the steering committee, and becoming a member of the Advisory Board. Earlier this year, with funding from DeRoy Testamentary Foundation, NCJW | MI committed to providing all the items needed for a full and functioning kitchen at Sanctum House. We have provided everything from dishes, glasses, and flatware, to every small appliance and cooking item needed in a well-used kitchen!

Now NCJW | MI will offer an opportunity to our members to volunteer at Sanctum House. Prior to volunteering, a three-hour training must be completed. We will offer a training on Sunday, January 27, 2019 from 1 pm to 4 pm at the NCJW | MI office.

Adult Guardianship

We serve as advocates on behalf of Oakland County Probate Court's Guardianship Department to protect seniors who have Court-appointed guardians. We visit facilities and group homes to ensure that the needs of the individual are being met by the guardian and/or the facility. We have an average of 8 visits per month to facilities in Farmington Hills, Bloomfield Hills, and West Bloomfield. We provide a vital service to help those whose guardians visit only quarterly.

We always have a need for more advocates. A case requires a short phone call with questions for the guardian, a visit to the facility, and filling out a form that is mailed to the Court. Please consider volunteering with us!

Jewish Youth Awards

NCJW | MI is proud to continue its tradition of honoring outstanding Jewish high school seniors with its annual Jewish Youth Awards. Candidates will be judged on a written essay and on their leadership both in the Jewish and/or secular communities. The program is open to Jewish High School seniors, and all are encouraged to apply. Eight finalists will receive a total of \$5,500 during an awards ceremony on Tuesday, May 14, 2019. Applications are due Monday, February 25, 2019. Judging is in person on Sunday, April 14, 2019. "So I'm Not the Only One?"

On a recent home visit, a Children's Advocate team met with a grandmother guardian, three children under the age of six, and the children's birth mother, age 23. The mother, at first indifferent to the visiting Advocates, was curled up on the sofa, wearing headphones, and obviously quite depressed.

When asked to remove the headphones, the CA's engaged her in a conversation and heard her story. She had given birth to her first child at age 15, and with the same young man, gave birth to two more children. She said she had no idea how to be a parent and had no patience to deal with her three adorable daughters.

Counseling was discussed and she said she didn't need it. At that point, one of the CA's handed her NCJW's Teen Yellow Pages. As she looked at it, her expression visibly changed and she said, "There is something like this available? There are that many people out there who need this help? So I'm not the only one?" She looked like she had just discovered

The Children's Advocates who are managing her case are working to get her into a program that will teach her parenting skills and enable her to find herself.

This is a perfect example of how NCJW is committed to improving the quality of life for women, children, and families. Our Children's Advocate Program and Teen Yellow Pages have come together to help this young woman, and so many others.

CHILDREN'S ADVOCATES

Children's Advocates continues to provide support to Oakland County Probate Court in handling short-term reviews of minors, ages six and under, in quardianship situations. We are the only agency in Oakland County to handle such cases. In teams, we process an average of 8-10 cases per month. We also continue to participate in court case reviews for minors under quardianship.

We are in the process of planning a luncheon inservice with 1-2 speakers. The speakers will discuss pertinent topics related to children's quardianships. Date to be determined. Jeannie Weiner and Gail Katz, along with an enthusiastic Shoes to Share Committee, met in September and used a list developed by the Chairs



to contact public and private schools as well as houses of worship to ask them to participate in collecting gently used shoes starting October 10th and ending October 29th. WISDOM (Women's Interfaith Solutions for Dialogue and Outreach in Metro Detroit) was invited to participate for the second year in a row.

Volunteers signed up to bring cartons and plastic bags for the shoe collections to 42 sites. The bags were filled with shoes at the end of the collection period and were brought to Suite 100 in the NCJW building. Volunteers signed up for the shoe sorting shifts for the month of November. We have connected with 23 agencies who would like the gently used shoes to help people in need in their community.

Thank you to everyone who helped out with our Shoes to Share 2018 project. We so appreciated your help in connecting with schools and houses of worship in Metro Detroit, in picking up and dropping off boxes and bags filled with shoes, and with sorting all of the shoes that were brought to the NCJW collection room. Suite 100 was overflowing with collected shoes! Close to 5,000 pairs of shoes were collected, sorted, and distributed.

Women's and men's shoes are needed for interviews and work situations. Children's shoes are needed to keep feet comfortable at school and warm traveling to and from their buildings. The youngsters were excited to receive stylish shoes. Most importantly, there will be warm feet for many this winter! We truly believe that children who share in such a collection project will learn to care about those in need in our community!
